History of The Lincoln Academy of Illinois

The Lincoln Academy was established by proclamation of the Governor of Illinois in 1964, shortly after the New York World's Fair. During the World's Fair a reception was given for some of our state's most celebrated sons and daughters which impressed Governor Otto Kerner and gave birth to a program to recognize distinguished Illinoisans annually through the establishment of the Order of Lincoln.

The *Order of Lincoln* honors individuals whose contributions to the betterment of humanity have been accomplished in Illinois, or whose achievements have brought honor to the state because of their identity with it, whether by birth or residence. It is the state's highest civilian award for professional achievement and public service.

Funds raised at the Academy's Order of Lincoln Convocation help provide the Abraham Lincoln Civic Engagement awards and the 'Lincoln Medallion' which will be presented by the Academy's President to each of 50 *Student Laureates* at a separate ceremony held in Springfield later this year.

Thus, the Lincoln Academy honors the Great Citizens of Today and Celebrates the Great Citizens for Tomorrow -- knowing that now, as always, our state and nation need what Vachel Lindsay called Lincoln-hearted' men and women.

The insignia of the Order of Lincoln is a variant of the Maltese cross (with ten points rather than eight). The obverse displays the Arms of the State of Illinois encircled by the inscription 'Palmam Qui Meruit, Ferat' ('Let him who merits bear the palm'—words from Horatio Viscount Nelson). The reverse central disc features the likeness of President Lincoln in gold. The cross is suspended from a ribbon in the colors of the state's symbols: red for the state bird, the cardinal; violet for the state flower; and green for the state tree, the oak.

The first Convocation and Investiture of Laureates to the Order of Lincoln was held on our 16th President's birthday, February 12, 1965, at the Chicago Historical Society. Convocations have been held in locations across the state every year since then. During the Lincoln Bicentennial in 2009, a special Bicentennial Edition of the Order of Lincoln was established, and thirty distinguished Lincoln scholars, collectors, artists, and curators from around the world were honored.

In 1992, Governor Jim Edgar, President of the Lincoln Academy, initiated the creation of a Hall of Fame of Historic Illinoisans whose achievements and contributions were made prior to the establishment of the Lincoln Academy in 1964. Fifty Hall of Fame Honorees were selected. In 2018, in recognition of the Bicentennial of Illinois, the Hall of Fame was reconstituted. Six new members of the Hall of Fame were selected by Academy Trustees.

The mission of the Lincoln Academy was expanded in 1975 by the Student Laureate Program, in which an outstanding senior from each of the four-year degree-granting colleges and universities in Illinois and one student representing our state's community colleges are honored. Since inception over 2,500 young Illinois leaders have been honored.

Bonnie Blair

The first American woman to win five gold medals at the Olympic Winter Games, speedskater **Bonnie Blair** dominated both on and off the ice. Her monumental career began at just four years old in her hometown of Champaign. She made her Olympic debut less than two decades later at the 1984 Sarajevo Games.

It was at the 1988 Calgary Games, in the 500 meter, that she earned her first Olympic gold medal, and in World Record time. She also went on to bring home a bronze medal in the 1,000 meter at the same games. Her dominance in the sport continued at the 1992 Winter Olympics in Albertville where she added two more gold medals - again in the 500 meter and the 1,000 meter races. And to recognize her exceptional place in the history of sports, Blair received the Sullivan Award, granted to the top American amateur athlete.

Blair stood atop the podium for her final two gold medals at the 1994 Olympic Games in Lillehammer, again demonstrating her preeminence in both the 500 meter and 1,000 meter races. Her consistent victories made her the first woman ever to win three consecutive Olympic gold medals in the 500 meter, earning her the recognition of Sports Illustrated Female Athlete of the Year. Her reign holds today as the most highly decorated American woman in Winter Olympic history.

In 1995, Blair won the World Sprint Championships in what is now her hometown of Milwaukee, Wisconsin. Later that year, she retired from the sport, and then shortly after, married four-time Olympian, David Cruikshank.

Since retiring, Blair has worked extensively with the Alzheimer's Association, dedicated to honoring the memory of her mother, Eleanor. Since 2011, she has hosted an annual Walk to End Alzheimer's, which culminates with the "Blair Cares" award, recognizing a volunteer who embodies the same passion as Blair. Additionally, she has made an impact through the American Brain Tumor Association, in memory of her brother, Rob, and extends her tireless fundraising efforts to the Leukemia Association, in memory of her sister, Mary.

A motivational speaker and philanthropist, Blair is also the Director of Community Engagement for the DASH Project Inc, Developing Athletes for Speedskating High-Performance. She has been an active member of the Pettit National Ice Center's Board of Directors since 1996. Adding to her impressive sports accolades, she also has been inducted into the US Speedskating Hall of Fame, Chicagoland Sports Hall of Fame, the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, and the United States Olympic Hall of Fame.

An Illinois native, Blair now resides in Wisconsin with her husband where they have raised and coached their children, Grant and Blair.

Sandra Cisneros

Chicago native **Sandra Cisneros** is a short-story writer, poet, novelist, essayist, performer, artist, and activist. She has received numerous honors, including a prestigious National Medal of Arts, created by Congress and bestowed by the President of the United States as the nation's highest recognition in the arts.

One of seven children, and the only daughter in the family, Cisneros attended Loyola University of Chicago. She graduated in 1976 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English. She then attended the University of Iowa, where in 1978, she received a Master of Fine Arts degree in creative writing.

Cisneros returned to Chicago, using her talents as a teacher and counselor at Latino Youth Alternative High School, then as an artist-in-the-schools teaching creative writing, and later as an arts administrator and college recruiter at her alma mater, Loyola University. She went on to serve as a visiting writer at California State University at Chico, the University of California Berkeley, the University of Michigan Ann Arbor, and the University of New Mexico.

In 1984, she published *The House on Mango Street*, which tells the story of a young Latina growing up in Chicago. It has gone on to sell more than eight million copies and is now required reading in middle schools, high schools, and universities across the country.

Cisneros has received many other honors for her poetry, short stories, and fiction, including the Texas Institute of Letters Dobie-Paisano Fellowship, two National Endowment for the Arts fellowships, the Texas Medal of the Arts, a Ford Foundation Art of Change Fellowship, and the PEN/Nabokov Award for Achievement in International Literature. More recently, she received a Poetry Foundation Ruth Lilly Poetry Prize and the Richard C. Holbrooke Distinguished Achievement Award from the Dayton Literary Peace Prize Foundation. Her books have been translated into more than 25 languages.

As a 1995 recipient of a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship, Cisneros helped organize Los MacArturos, a caucus of Latino awardees united in community service, and founded two nonprofits. The Alfred Cisneros Del Moral Foundation, a grant-giving institution, served Texas writers for fifteen years. Macondo Writers Workshop, with a mission to help and encourage writers who are committed to activism, celebrates its 30th anniversary in 2025. This year, Cisneros will receive the Ivan Sandrof Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Book Critics Circle. And in July, an opera based on *The House on Mango Street*, a collaboration with composer Derek Bermel, will premiere at The Glimmerglass Festival in Cooperstown, NY.

Jeanne Gang

Architect **Jeanne Gang** is the founding partner of Studio Gang, an international architecture and urban design practice with offices in Chicago, New York, San Francisco, and Paris. Her inquisitive, forward-looking approach to design – unique in its pursuit of new technical and material possibilities as well as in its expansion of the active role of designers in society – has distinguished her as a leading architect of her generation.

An Illinois native, Gang is the architect of two towers that have redefined Chicago's skyline: the 101-story St. Regis Chicago, now the city's third-tallest building, and the 82-story, undulating Aqua Tower. Other completed projects include the John W. Boyer Center, the University of Chicago's new hub for scholarship and exchange in Paris; Richard Gilder Center for Science, Education, and Innovation at the American Museum of Natural History in New York; the reimagined Arkansas Museum of Fine Arts in Little Rock; Writers Theatre, a professional theater in Glencoe, Illinois; and the Arcus Center for Social Justice Leadership at Kalamazoo College in Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Gang's ongoing work includes major cultural and civic projects throughout the Americas and Europe, such as a new United States Embassy in Brasilia; Stanford University's new Sustainability Commons in Palo Alto; and an expansion of the Clinton Presidential Library in Little Rock. Soaring buildings in Toronto, Paris, and Boston are also underway.

Guiding the next generation of architects, Gang is a Professor in Practice at her alma mater, the Harvard Graduate School of Design, where her teaching and research focus on the cultural and environmental aspects of buildings' reuse. She also has authored four books on architecture. Her most recent, *The Art of Architectural Grafting*, was released last year in both French and English editions. Her work has been exhibited widely, including at the Museum of Modern Art, the International Venice Architecture Biennale, and the Art Institute of Chicago.

Gang is a MacArthur Fellow, 2017 William A. Bernoudy Architect in Residence at the American Academy in Rome, an elected member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and a member of the American Institute of Architects' College of Fellows. She has been honored with the Cooper Hewitt National Design Award in Architecture and was named one of 2019's most influential people in the world by TIME Magazine. Further accolades include WSJ. Magazine's 2022 Architecture Innovator of the Year, the 2022 ULI Prize for Visionaries in Urban Development, the 2023 Charlotte Perriand Award, and Architectural Review's Architect of the Year.

Janice Jackson

Chicago native **Janice K. Jackson, EdD** has spent her career making instrumental strides in the field of education, now as the CEO of Hope Chicago and formerly as CEO of Chicago Public Schools (CPS) – making history as the first CPS alum to serve in that role. Jackson is a renowned leader with a track record of improving academic outcomes in urban school systems and providing educational leadership.

Jackson graduated from Chicago State University (CSU) with a degree in history and secondary education. While working as a social studies teacher and debate team coach at South Shore Community High School, she continued her studies at CSU, earning a master's degree in history.

In 2003, she helped acquire a \$500,000 grant from the Gates Foundation to underwrite the establishment of Al Raby High School and Jackson served as founding principal. After Al Raby became one of the district's most successful neighborhood schools, Jackson was tapped to open another, George Westinghouse College Prep, whose success is recognized nationally due to its thriving world language program and partnerships.

While she was transforming educational experiences for others, she returned to the classroom herself, this time at the University of Illinois Chicago, where she earned a second master's degree, in education in leadership and administration, followed by a doctorate in Urban Education Leadership.

In 2014, her leadership talents took her into CPS administration, where as a Network Chief she oversaw 26 schools and 14,000 students. She went on to serve as Chief Education Officer, and in 2017, was promoted to CEO. Her 22-year tenure with the district is most notable for the district's results in advancing equitable student outcomes. Jackson's efforts, along with those of Chicago's dedicated teachers and principals, propelled students to record-breaking gains in academic achievement, graduation, and post-secondary completion.

Jackson departed CPS in 2021and today serves as CEO of Hope Chicago, a public-private partnership working to drive economic mobility for disinvested communities through scholarships for Chicago families at scale. In three short years, Hope Chicago has enrolled more than 1,800 students from Chicago's South, Southwest and West Sides – plus approximately 200 Parent Scholars – in postsecondary and workforce programs completely debt-free.

Jackson serves as a Senior Fellow at the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and served as a Distinguished Fellow at the University of Chicago Institute for Politics. In 2024, she was named the Inspire Change Changemaker by the Chicago Bears. Jackson resides on Chicago's South Side with her husband, Torrence, and two children.

Carol Marin

Native Illinoisan **Carol Marin** is an esteemed journalist and Peabody Award-winning reporter. Her career affiliations include WMAQ-TV Chicago, CBS News, "60 Minutes," and the Evening News with Dan Rather. She also served as a columnist for the Chicago Sun-Times and was a regular contributor to "Chicago Tonight" on WTTW, a public broadcast station. Her reporting focused on critical news involving local and statewide government, public policy, public corruption and organized crime, and politics.

Marin's influential career in journalism began after graduating from the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign. In 1972, she began as a reporter, anchor, and assistant news director at WBIR-TV in Knoxville, Tennessee. Four years later, her career took her to WSM-TV in Nashville, where she played a significant role in investigative reporting.

Marin returned to Illinois after she was hired by the NBC-owned and operated station, WMAQ-TV. She would spend nearly two decades as part of WMAQ's broadcasting team. In her next role, Marin was hired by CBS News, where she worked as a network correspondent and an investigative reporter.

In 1997, Marin received the prestigious Peabody Award. She and producer Don Moseley received another Peabody Award in 1998 for their documentary on the facially disfigured. The duo went on to receive national Emmys in 1989 and 1998, as well as two Alfred I. duPont-Columbia Awards in 1986 and 1998, recognizing their exceptional reporting.

2002 was an illustrious year for Marin. Together with Moseley, she formed an independent documentary company, Marin Corp Productions, and also received the coveted Gracie Award from American Women in Radio & Television. Their Marin Corp Productions, which is located at DePaul University in Chicago, where the dynamic news duo also launched the Center for Journalism Integrity and Excellence, has produced programs for CNN and The New York Times/Discovery Channel.

Marin returned to WMAQ in 2004, as the station's political editor. Two years later she also signed on as a contributor to *Chicago Tonight* on WTTW. Her outstanding journalism once again culminated in industry recognition, this time earning her a third Peabody Award for investigative reporting in 2015.

It was in 2020 that Marin announced she would be making her departure from WMAQ and WTTW. A respected journalist known throughout Chicagoland, Marin continues in her role as founding director of the Center for Journalism Integrity and Excellence.

Julieanna Richardson

Committed to making a meaningful difference in all her endeavors, **Julieanna L. Richardson's** influential efforts hold a storied place in our nation's history. As founder and president of *The HistoryMakers*, a Chicago-based nonprofit, she heads this nonpartisan, digital, archival collection of African-American oral histories.

Richardson graduated from Brandeis University with a double-major in theatre arts and American studies. There, she encountered her first experience with the power of oral history while studying the Harlem Renaissance. Richardson went on to graduate from Harvard Law School in 1980 and started her career as a corporate attorney for the Chicago law firm of Jenner & Block. She later took her first role in the media industry, as cable administrator for the City of Chicago Office of Cable Communications.

Her career blossomed when she founded Shop Chicago, a regional shopping channel. From there, Richardson created her own production company, SCTN Teleproductions. Over the next eight years, SCTN Teleproductions managed three local cable channels and served as the local production extension for C-SPAN.

In 1999, without any formal training or funding, Richardson began an archive, compiling over 3,500 African American video oral histories. One of the first was that of Tuskegee Airman Colonel Bill Thompson. Others include United States Secretary of State and chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff General Colin Powell, Cubs legend Ernie Banks, poet and author Maya Angelou, President Barack Obama, and many other influential voices. In her work documenting the African American experience in our nation's history, Richardson's archive contains over 348 Illinoisans, more than any other state on record.

In 2012, the United States Library of Congress became the permanent repository for Richardson's collection, making it only their second major African American oral history collection, the first being, *Born in Slavery: Slave Narratives from the Federal Writers' Project.* The culmination of these archives stands together in our national library, powerful stories from the formerly enslaved to the African American experience of our society today. Additionally, the National Football League donated its archive of Black player interviews which includes Hall of Famer and retired wide receiver Jerry Rice.

Richardson is widely recognized for her historic work, which demonstrates that history is always in the making. She has received honorary degrees from Howard University, Dominican University and Brandeis University. She was honored as a prominent Chicagoan, receiving the Chicago History Museum's John Hope Franklin Making History Award.

The General Trustees are appointed by the Governor or are elected by the Academy. Nine Rectors assist in identifying potential nominees for The Order of Lincoln. The Academic Trustees are the chief executive officers of all four-year colleges and universities in Illinois and three members at-large.
